Glassroom Updates

1ST GRADE

Phonics: We are finishing up long vowels with silent e and starting on long vowels with vowel teams.

Comprehension: We will be reading mostly fiction stories to learn lessons or morals. **Writing**: This unit we will be understanding how to create opinion pieces on how we like or feel about something. Students will write a topic sentence, provide reasons, examples, and a closing sentence.

Grammar: This unit we will learn about proper nouns and forming simple sentences.

Math: We will finish our unit on subtracting through 20 and begin chapter 6, where students will learn about place value and counting by ones by twos, by fives, and by tens to 120. Your student will learn what it means when a digit is in the tens place or the one's place, read and write numbers, and recognize how many tens and ones makeup numbers up to 120. The vocabulary words associated with this chapter are 120 chart, row, column, decade numbers, digit, ones, tens, ones place, tens place expanded form, expanded form, and word form.

Science: Students will be able to demonstrate & describe the various ways that objects can move, such as in a straight line, zigzag, back-&-forth, round-&-round, & fast & slow. Then will get into learning about pushes & pulls.

Social Studies: Students will create a timeline based on their life or school events, using primary sources. We will also talk about National Holidays including Martin Luther King Day.

2ND GRADE

In **ELA** we will be starting a new unit about Technology and how we can solve problems using technology. Students will explore text features, author's purpose, central idea, and diving deeper into vocabulary.

Math: I can subtract within 100 using various strategies. I can add and subtract within 1,000 using various strategies.

In **science** we will be starting our topic on energy, force, and motion. Students will be exploring different forms of energy, how pushes and pulls effect objects, and how different amounts of force change the motion of objects.

In **writing** we will be working on writing an opinion essay. Students will have to write an essay stating their opinion about a topic and give supporting reasons. While writing our essays, we will be working on making sure we are using punctuation, capitalization, and grade level appropriate spelling.

3RD GRADE

We are excited to get this new year started!! We have had a great first week back. Here are some of the things happening in third grade:

In **ELA**, we will be putting our detective hats on for Context Clues. We will also be learning about cause and effect in both fiction and nonfiction. We will be revisiting some content for review, for our upcoming PM2 FAST assesment.

In Social Studies, we are continuing with our unit on Economics. We had great success with our Economics stores. The kids were so creative!

For **Math**, we will be learning about area and ending the month in fractions. We are still working hard on learning our multiplication facts. We highly encourage daily practice. Flash cards are alway a great way to practice.

Science: We are learning about types of energy and how energy can cause things to change or move. For activities at home where they are creating motion. Flapping arms, pushing their chair, rolling a pencil.

4TH GRADE

ELA: Students will be focusing on standard 4.R.2.4- Explain an author's claim and the reasons and evidence used to support the claim.

Math: Students will be adding and subtracting fractions. Science: Students are learning about energy and motion.
Social Studies: Students will be learning about Florida Explorers.

5TH GRADE

In **ELA**, we are continuing to work on grammar and apply those skills in our writing. We are practicing "proofreading as we write" and using our Writing Notebooks for reference when writing an essay for argumentative or expository prompts. In Poetry, we are analyzing elements of structure for mood, tone, rhyme scheme, rhyme patterns, meter, figurative language, line structure, theme, and refrains (repeated phrases).

In Social Studies, we will begin the year with Colonial America. This is always a student favorite as we learn how we grew as a brand-new nation!

In **Science**, we are wrapping up the matter unit.

In Math, we just finished whole-number division and we are now moving into division with decimals.

K & 1st are learning what builds a story as we make our own fairy tales and then practice performing them.


TSquad: We're getting ready for our FESTAF competition in February and our one-act, student written extravaganza TSquad: Unplugged (performance in May)

3rd graders started their Monoprint Roosters, where they are learning about Grant Wood, printmaking, space, and warm and cool colors.

COSTUME REQUIREMENTS:

Lord of the Rings (Weaver/Bartlett/Brumley/Robles) – All students who do not have speaking parts can dress as wizards or elves, as long as their clothes do not interfere with their dancing. No hats, masks, beards, capes, or weapons. Neutral colors preferred.

If you're named character, you can dress as the character as long as your costume does not impede with your dancing. Gandalf can wear a hat, Legolas can wear fake ears, and Spiderman can wear a full mask, as long as he can remove it when he doesn't have his speaking part. For ideas for costuming, click here.

Star Wars (Kimmel/Simmons/Willis/Clevinger) – All students who do not have speaking parts can dress as Jedis/Sith. This can be as simple as a neutral-colored bathrobe. If you do something elaborate it still cannot interfere with their dancing. No hats, masks, or capes. NO WEAPONS or STORMTOOPER ARMOR.

If you're named character, you can dress as that character, but no masks (Sorry Darth Vader). Darth Vader can wear a cape. Princess Leia must have her hair in the classic side-bun design. Click here for a picture. In an effort to keep our Stormtroopers similar, we're like them to be dress in just a stormtrooper shirt and black pants. A t-shirt like this would work perfect. Homemade ones are fine too. Again, no masks.

Wizard of Oz (Manning/Raulerson/Perrick/Infante) – All students who do not have speaking parts can dress as zombies. Tattered, marked-up clothes would be great, as long as it is not revealing (Halloween zombie style). Zombie makeup is allowed.

We will analyze the authors' purpose in multiple accounts of the same event. We will also prepare to write our first expository essay!

The Math department is discovering the realm of 'percentages, ratios, and the application of absolute values.' This will also be the time of our second (F.A.S.T.), progress monitoring exam, and we are looking for improvement from our first exam earlier this fall. Scitney/Science-I am excited for the field trip to Orlando Science Center on January 22. Please be mindful that student forms and payment (\$22) are due January 12. Students will pick groups the following week. Students are beginning their (traditionally) most challenging unit on Weather and Climate. We will work in this unit across the entire month. Students will conduct a summative project starting around January 18th and will take their DIA sometime around January 30. As a reminder, my late work policy allows students to turn in assignments from the current unit up until the day after testing. Afterwards, students will need to conduct enrichment activities from the current unit that can apply points to previous unit assignments. Our field trip to the Orlando Science Center will support the unit in a module we elected during part of the trip.

Ortiz/History- Happy New Year! I hope you and your family had a wonderful break! The first half of the year was amazing, and I know the second half will be even better! This month we are moving into Unit 4, Creating a new nation, where we will be learning about the consequences of the American Revolution and the founding principles of our nation. As we begin the new year, I would like to remind you about the late work policy in my class. Late work will be accepted up to seven days past the due date, after which point it will no longer be accepted and students will earn a zero for the assignment. Thank you for your continued support it is greatly appreciated.

7TH GRADE

Welcome back! We hope you all had a wonderful time with your family during the break and that you had a chance to unplug and unwind.

For the next six weeks in **Civics**, students will be learning about the Bill of Rights and the American Legal System. Our DIA and remediation for Unit 5 will be February 14–16. If you haven't joined my Remind yet the code is: @hawncivics.

In **ELA**, we have an important date coming up on January 9th – the second Fast Progress Monitoring test. It's a great opportunity to gauge our students' progress so please be sure your student is well-rested and gives their best effort. Additionally, we'll be starting our journey into the classic novel, "The Outsiders" by S.E. Hinton.

In **Math**, please be on the lookout for an updated procedures paper from students. Make sure those are signed and brought back as soon as possible! This month we will be working on inequalities in regular math. Accelerated math will be starting angles and triangles.




8TH GRADE
